What is CAS?

- **CAS is a web-based tool that allows students, advisors and guests to view course equivalency and degree program requirements at various levels of complexity and detail.**
- **The user can create an account, or login as a guest, and review course equivalency data, degree planning guides and institutional information for any school in the CAS network.**



What is CAS?

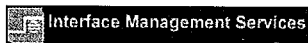
- After students create CAS accounts they can data enter their completed and anticipated coursework and run institution specific planning guides (degree audits).
- Currently 198 institutions across 11 states are involved in the CAS project.
- Six states (Ohio, Arizona, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana and Kentucky) are state-wide implementations.



What is CAS?



CAS is a product of Miami University, Ohio. Miami University has a national reputation in degree audit and transfer articulation product excellence with proven success of their degree audit system DARwin.



Interface Management Services (IMS) has created Student Information System (SIS) integration to import course requests.



The University of North Texas and The University of Texas at Dallas have implemented CAS as a tool for communicating transfer information. Collin College, North Central Texas College and Tarrant County College have implemented CAS integration for their students to quickly load completed courses.



Using CAS

ANY USER CAN VIEW COURSE EQUIVALENCIES: Course equivalencies can be viewed by any user via multiple search criteria. As many as five institutions can be reviewed at one time.

Using CAS

- Users can create an account and store completed and anticipated courses in CAS.
- Courses can be data entered directly into CAS and stored and modified as needed.
- To enter courses into CAS users only need the:

Regular: The planning guide runs against the selected institution degree requirements, applies any applicable transfer courses and displays remaining courses for the degree.

Cross Reference/Reverse: The planning guide runs against the selected institution degree requirements, applies any applicable transfer courses and displays remaining courses for the degree, but also notes any courses that have direct equivalents at a second specific institution.



Using CAS

Planning Guide Output:

- Completed Requirements in **BLUE** and marked as "OK" or a "+".
- Requirements completed with a transfer course are noted with the title of the course, course number and institution and core element if applicable.
- Requirements that are not complete are marked in **RED** and list the UNT course needed to complete the requirements.
- If an equivalent course exists for a UNT degree requirement the course is listed in **GREEN**.

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CAS Strengths and Challenges

- Access to all of UNT's transfer articulations online.
